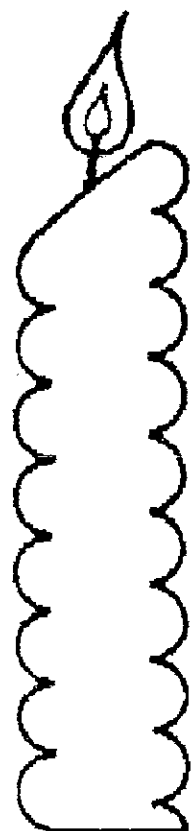
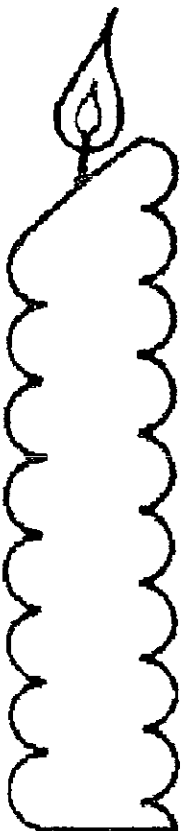

SPRING CLEANUP REPORT

What a team effort! Gifford Park's Pride happens to be the title of this newsletter, and WOW did our pride shine bright on an otherwise mostly cloudy and cool day that began at 8 a.m. and finished about 4 p.m. Saturday, April 11th. So many neighborhood volunteers worked so hard during the GPNA Spring Cleanup Day, and everyone had a smile throughout the day.

SUMMARY OF EVENTS

Here is a summary of the day's events:

- filled 10 dumpsters (most were 20 cubic yd containers)
- filled 7 City of Omaha trucks (these trucks ain't small!)
- hauled 3 Kiewit Construction Company flatbed truckloads to the dump
- used 20 tree chipper passes and 8 landfill passes
- recycled 18 appliances
- recycled scrap metal and aluminum which netted over \$70
- recycled salvageable garage sale items and given to neighborhood people
- sold 17 GPNA memberships
- received \$73 in donations
- cleaned Gifford Park in preparation for our annual Easter Egg Hunt
- helped countless neighbors haul trash (many of these people have no other means of disposing of this trash without the spring cleanup program)
- provided recycling information
- snarfed-down 200 hotdogs and 5 cases of pop at the picnic in Gifford Park

WHAT'S IN A NAME?*by Eva Swanson*

Do you live on a named street between Dodge and Cuming? Ever wonder how it got its name? A little research at the Omaha Public Library revealed the following bits of history:

DODGE— A 1926 publication claims this street was named in honor of General Grenville M. Dodge, chief engineer in building the Union Pacific Railroad. A 1917 publication, however, recorded that Dodge Street bears the name of Augustus C. Dodge. He introduced the bill in the U.S. Senate that resulted in the organization of the Territory of Nebraska in 1854.

DAVENPORT — Named by a group of bankers from Davenport, Iowa, who opened a branch banking house in Florence. The street was named in honor of their home town and also honors a leading family of that city.

CHICAGO — Chicago, Illinois. "Chicago, Davenport, and Omaha" were on the direct line of travel to the gold fields.

CASS — Named in honor of General Lewis Cass, secretary of state in President Buchanan's cabinet. He ran for president of the U.S. in 1848 but was defeated by Zachary Taylor.

CALIFORNIA — Said to have been named because the gold seekers of the early 1850's landed near the foot of this street. They crossed the Missouri River on the "Lone Tree" ferry and continued their way west via "California" Street.

WEBSTER — Named in honor of Colonel E. Daniel Webster, private secretary to Marlin H. Seward, the Secretary of State. Col. Webster was instrumental in organizing the Republican Party. He died in 1852, two years before Omaha was platted. The street led to and from the Webster Street depot.

BURT — Named in honor of Francis Burt, first territorial governor of Nebraska. He died of colonitis in Bellevue on October 18, 1854, only 12 days after his arrival in the territory.

CUMING — Named in honor of Thomas B. Cuming, second territorial governor of Nebraska, who succeeded Francis Burt.

MR. ELMER SWANSON*by Leo Wilwerding*

Our oldest member passed away on April 6th. Elmer Swanson, who lived at 3417 Webster Street for 69 years, moved there on his wedding day in 1923. His wife, Elsa, and his daughter, Eva, survive him and continue as members of the GPNA.

Mr. Swanson was born in Sweden in 1891 and as a 17 year old, came alone to the United States. What courage it must have taken. Speaking only Swedish, he mistakenly got on the wrong train after leaving Ellis Island. Instead of Omaha, he ended up in St. Louis. Friendly persons there got him on the right train for Omaha. He arrived here in the Union Station at midnight, took a streetcar to 16th and Farnam and got off because most of the other on the car were doing so. After looking up and down the almost deserted street, he wandered north until he came to a hotel of sorts — a veritable flop-house where for 25 cents he got a bed in a big room containing about twenty other sleeping men. Leaving his clothes on, he put his shoes under the pillow and went to sleep. Next morning, he arose, found a little restaurant where he obtained pancakes by indicating with sign language that he wanted the same as another patron was eating. He then proceeded south on 16th Street and came to the King-Swanson store in which his uncle was a partner. Recognizing the name on the sign, he walked in, about a week late, to the complete surprise and relief of his uncle. He went to work and continued there when the name was changed to Nebraska Clothing Company. He did not retire until he was over 70 years old. As a buyer and salesman, he was known to most of the businessmen of the city. Mr. Swanson was an avid gardener and famous for his lovely flowers — sweet peas, roses, lilies and dinner plate sized dahlias were his forte. Being the first in the neighborhood to have fresh tomatoes was his pride. He returned to his native Sweden four times for visits and was able to chide his Mother about her insistence that he initially take enough money for a round-trip ticket because she was sure he would not like it in America. Always soft-spoken, he had a quiet but well-developed wit. He looked-- and was -- a real gentlemen, and a wonderful neighbor.
